Brighter Future Collective / Youth Initiatives

Youth/BFC

The Islamic Council of Queensland have set up the Brighter Future Collective to deliver in collaboration with other national providers on the Youth Transition Support Pilot Program. This is an initiative funded out of the federal Department of Social Services to develop and deliver innovative engagement initiatives for young people of migrant and refugee background. ICQ/BFC have been tasked with delivering outcomes to 460 young people over the pilot to date across the pillars of sports/cultural engagement, education, training and employment. The pilot is currently scheduled to run until 30 June 2018.





Youth Connect QLD

ICQ and the Brighter Future Collective have supported and partnered with Youth Connect QLD to help establish itself to provide a positive mentoring environment for young people across the community. The focus is on exposure to organised sport, study and career support and to provide leadership development opportunities for young people.



ICQ and BFC have sponsored Youth Connect QLD in their inaugural year

providing both financial support through the Youth Transition Support Pilot Program funding as well as providing the location for Youth Connect to base itself at the ICQ leased facility, Oates Park, Oates Avenue, Woodridge. Learn to Drive

This year, the Islamic Council of Queensland, with the support of Gear-Up Driving School, launched a subsidised driving program for our community. The program provides affordable packages for driving lessons to support recently arrived Refugee and Migrants as well as people suffering from financial hardships.

To date, fifty-five participants of the program have successfully completed 5 driving lessons and significantly improved their ability to drive. Twenty-two of these participants were referred by ICQ's member organisation, the Islamic Women's Association of Australia (IWAA).

A representative from IWAA stated: "We are very pleased with this program and are so grateful that our clients were given this opportunity to learn to drive. Something all of them would not have been able to achieve without this program."

Logan Roos Football Academy

Logan Roos Football Academy is a soccer club established by Youth Connect QLD and sponsored by the Islamic Council of QLD to initially provide a safe and welcoming environment for members across the various local communities to engage in organised, completive soccer. In its first season, the Logan Roos entered a Senior Men's team into the South East Queensland Football League Division 2 competition and the team took out the Premiership winning the Grand Final 2-1. Learn to Swim


The Islamic Council of Queensland, with the assistance of Sisters Support Services, has successfully conducted a Six-Week swimming program for ladies suffering from financial hardship and/or of Refugee-Migrant backgrounds. This very successful program provided the community with a private facility and a female instructor at an affordable price.

ICQ Program's Co-ordinator, Dina Ghaznavi said: "For the last six weeks I have had the privilege of assisting 36 amazing women in learning to swim. Every single attendee gave the program their absolute best. While most were afraid of entering the water on their first day, I can confidently say that every single person will now be able to save their lives and the lives of their loved ones if ever there is a need."

Youth Camp - Girls

On the weekend of the 21st of July, 40 girls went on a Youth Camp, an initiative of the Islamic Council of Queensland, supported by Islamic Relief Australia. The camp was aimed at enabling young women in the Muslim community to build a strong support network for one another. The camp was held at Binna Burra Mountain Lodge where many camp attendees tried activities like flying fox, abseiling and high-ropes for the first time. The girls partook in a variety of such activities during the day and in the evenings collecting around a campfire to discuss important topics chosen by the group. A survey conducted at the end of the camp identified Islamophobia, Domestic Violence and Mental Health as the most useful topics of discussion.

Community Liaison officer for the Australian Federal Police, Amna Karra-Hassan, was invited to share her experiences. Her talk was deeply motivational as she firmly discussed the importance of being confident with one's identity and succeeding in every aspect of life, whilst never having to compromise one's religion. The camp experience concluded with Imam Uzair's "Ask An Imam" segment, wherein Imam Uzair visited the camp site to answer anonymous questions accumulated by the group over the weekend. This segment was widely acknowledged by attendees as the highlight, as well as a perfect conclusion to the camp.

Youth Camp - Boys

An ICQ led initiative, in collaboration with Youth Connect QLD, was a leadership and personal development camp for boys at Bornhoffen PCYC Leadership Centre in the Gold Coast hinterland with 120 boys in attendance. Workshops were delivered where the boys could take advice and discuss Implications of listening to unqualified leaders online, Islam's view on unlawful violence, negative impact of participating in overseas conflicts, importance of analysing and questioning sources of online material, using the democratic process to air grievances & influence change, the negative impact of drugs and alcohol and the importance of respect for family & being grateful.

A further special workshop was delivered on perseverance and overcoming adversity by Australian UFC mixed martial artist Brendan O'Reilly





Women's Self Defence

In November 2017, The Islamic Council of Queensland, with the support of Southside Academy of Combat, began a free 12-week Self Defence program for 20 female participants. Southside Academy provides a safe and private place to teach a holistic system of self-defence, that is simple in application and maintains effectiveness. Female instructor, Cherie Dowley, is a Brazilian Jiu Jitsu purple belt and a former Australian Champions Cup gold medalist.

Maliha Meya, a young participant said: "As a hijabi and a student, it becomes difficult to be able to afford private gyms such as Fernwood to exercise. Three classes a week for twelve weeks has really motivated me to focus on my health. Cherie is amazing and the Self Defence skills I have learnt so far is just a bonus!"

Mosque Next Door

The Mosque Next Door was a project embarked upon by Ali Kadri, ICQ and SBS. The television cameras were granted 24hours a day, 7 days a week access to Holland Park Masjid over the period of 12 months. Having recently gone to air, the three-part series focuses on the challenges the Muslim community currently face in today's Australia while also showing that Muslim Australians are just as Australian as everyone else. By all reports the endeavour was a resounding success with ICQ and Ali personally receiving national and international feedback from Muslim and non-Muslim alike.

Perhaps it was best said by "Sarah" when she posted: The Mosque Next Door is one of the most open, real and eye opening shows I've ever seen.

Like everyone I had assumptions, things/facts I thought I knew - not negative, but misconceptions. While I can see differences, the most striking things I see are the similarities.

QLD Community Alliance

The Queensland Community Alliance (QCA) is an alliance of the biggest faith groups coming together with charities, unions, community organisations and ethnic associations who work together for the common good. This Alliance is based around the personal relationships built across organisations in our local area. The Islamic Council of Queensland became a member of the Alliance in November 2017.

QCA along with its many members, decide on priorities for action together, through a process of listening to stories of pressures that our members face and witness. QCA identifies and trains people to become leaders in community organising. Recently, Dina Ghaznavi of ICQ, partook in a 6-day training experience with the Alliance. She said "Community organising is about bringing people together, so that they are powerful enough to create the change they want to see. I spent the most part of my week with 14 amazing leaders from community organisations all over Brisbane. I can't wait to work with them to create changes in so many of our shared concerns."

Mosque Open Day

On Sunday 3rd December, following on from the success of the SBS series, The Mosque Next Door, the Holland Park Mosque, with the support of the Islamic Council of Queensland, opened it's doors to welcome the Australian public. With over two hundred non-Muslim attendees, the BBQ Open day was a great success. Imam Uzair Akbar and Br. Ali Kadri answered a wide range of questions relating to Islam and Muslims.

Free henna art, Arabic calligraphy, hijab tutorials and face-painting for kids were some of the few activities prepared by generous volunteers from the Holland Park Mosque community. Volunteers also worked tirelessly preparing a delicious BBO against the 34-degree heat of the day. Pleasing feedback at the end of the day ensured the hard work was worth it. Attendees who travelled from as far as Dalby and Sunshine Coast expressed gratitude and positive experiences on social media.

ICQ Community Forum

On the 20th and 21st of May, the Islamic Council of Queensland (ICQ) conducted a community forum where the Muslim community of Brisbane, as well as representatives from regional towns, were welcomed in a far-reaching consultation to discuss pertinent issues related to the Muslim community. These conversations centred on creating a positive Muslim identity in Australia, and provided an outlet for the community to voice any concerns, issues or topics of discussion that are relevant to the current climate and perception of the overall Muslim community. Discussions mainly focused on the positives and negatives related to how our community organisations operate.

In a broad overview, attendees expressed satisfaction at the level and pace of work involving humanitarian, community, and social work. Fundraising, funeral services and religious education were listed as services provided well by local Muslim organisations.

Attendees identified many serious concerns with the methods of operation used by community representative organisations at local and federal levels. Major structural and management issues were noted. The issues of Islamophobia and extremism were discussed. Racism, internal and external, was also brought up. Problems with attaining jobs as a consequence of islamophobia, and the alienation and stigmatisation of community members was conversed. The need for high-quality media management in combating negative perceptions of Islam was also identified.

Ultimately, concerns centred around the need for community organisations that are effective, representative and responsive – that promote unity, competency and prioritise important needs and issues. Building the service and delivery capacities of our community, especially through peak representative bodies such as ICQ ensure that the Muslim community is empowered to deal not only with its own issues, but also to counteract narratives of extremists who may try to use the fear and frustrations of Muslims for extremely negative ends. A mature, inter-connected and dynamic community setup is the best way to tackle all these issues.

Focus for next year and upcoming events

ICQ will continue to work to advocate for the broader Muslim community and consult with community leaders to develop new programs and initiatives to help our young people become the community leaders and role models of tomorrow. Major priorities will include a rebuild of the ICQ digital landscape to make it easy for the community to receive updates and to provide feedback to ICQ. It will also provide up to date Halal certifications and provide a volunteer/employee-employer matching function to help employers identify and recruit from members of the community the right skill set and attitude. We will also continue to be involved with community events to raise awareness and support for worthwhile initiatives. The next event coming up in January will be for the Logan Roos Football Academy held on Sunday 14 January at Oates Park, Woodridge.
