A Culture of Peace, as promoted by United Nations' agencies, NGOs and peace educators, encompasses values, attitudes, modes of behaviour and ways of life that reject violence in all manifestations. It also seeks to address the root causes of conflicts and peacelessness, and to resolve them through creative and participatory non-violent strategies

Multi-Faith Centre, Griffith University, established in 2002, is a venue where people from diverse faith, religious and spirituality traditions can deepen their understanding of their own faith and actively participate in interfaith dialogue, education and action. It also seeks to engage in education, research and advocacy in interfaith and intra-faith dialogue towards a culture of peace in local, national and global contexts. Key programs and activities of the MFC include multi-faith prayers, interfaith and intra-faith dialogue forums, symposia, conferences, workshops, exhibitions, concerts, curriculum development, in-service training, publications and networking.

Believing Women for a Culture of Peace is an interfaith women's organisation operating in Brisbane, Australia since early 2004, with occasional activities in other Queensland locations. It aims to promote understanding, respectful relationships and mutual support among women of diverse faiths, spiritual paths and cultures, and to develop the capacity of members to be proactive in transforming conflict and generating a culture of peace. Many of its activities seek to engage wider public audiences. It is committed to building partnerships with other local organisations or initiatives addressing prejudice and divisiveness, and has a vision of forging links between women's interfaith initiatives within the region and beyond.

Vision & Purposes

Around the world, people of faith are actively engaged in developing interfaith relationships and initiating a wide variety of interfaith activities. Complemented by intra-faith dialogue, this broad movement is making a critical contribution in our times to efforts to overcome destructive conflict and build just and peaceful societies in our world.

The symposium will recognise and highlight the unique contribution that women of diverse faith communities in the Asia-Pacific region are making to the interfaith movement and interfaith initiatives in the broader social context. It will help to facilitate the sharing of information, insights and skills, and explore ways to strengthen their efforts to transform conflict and foster peace.

The symposium will also provide a forum for learning about hopeful intra-faith dialogue initiatives emerging within faith communities and institutions, for empowering women and promoting their equitable participation in their respective faiths and the wider society.

Objectives

- Strengthen efforts of women's faith/interfaith groups and initiatives to transform conflict and foster a "culture of peace" at all levels;
- Develop understanding of critical elements in conflict generation and prevention from women's experience and perspectives;
- Provide opportunities for participants to learn from "best practice" in interfaith activities for conflict resolution and peace-building;
- Learn about positive initiatives within faith communities and institutions, including by men in those communities and institutions, to empower women and promote their equitable participation;
- Enhance the capacity and leadership potential of women engaged in interfaith initiatives to be involved in relevant policy and decision-making arenas;
- Build stronger and sustainable connections among women's interfaith initiatives within the region and beyond for sharing of resources and mutual support.

Programme Highlights

• Plenary panels on interfaith and intra-faith dialogue themes relevant to "women and faith in building a culture of peace" in today's society and world, especially in the Asia-Pacific region.

• **Concurrent workshops** on a wide range of topics related to women and interfaith and intrafaith dialogue and perspectives

Small group processes, to allow participants to develop and share insights into women's interfaith and intra-faith experiences and initiatives.

- Prayer and reflection as an integral dimension of the whole symposium.

IMMIGRATION

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For participants requiring an Australian visa, **processing takes a minimum of 6 weeks.** We advise that you start filing your application as soon as possible. Before the Australian Visa Office in your country will consider your application they will want the following evidence:

1) your registration for the conference (including paying the registration fee – unless you are a scholarship recipient)

2) your official invitation to participate in the conference

Once you have registered, the Conference Secretariat will:

1) send you a letter in support of your visa application.

2) send the same information to the Australian Immigration Office in Brisbane

We will be sending more information about visiting Australia when your registration is confirmed.
