No excuse for incompetence

I am writing to reflect my irritation at the lack of journalistic competence shown by Richard Kerbaj in the Australian on 23/24 April and then again later on 25 April. Not only was this pitiful sensationalism in it's attempt to inflame the terrorism debate.....but also absurd in it's baseless accusation of GIRU and Griffith University fostering terrorism links for a measely \$100,000, since this is all they received. In all of this, not a single iota of credible evidence has been put forward. The only "evidence" supporting this article was from an inconsequential judge who claims to have received no answer to his request for information.
