Thousands flock to 'beautiful' Qur'an reading

Morocco - Casablanca's magnificent Hassan II Mosque has enjoyed remarkable mass attendance in this holy month of Ramadan thanks to a 30-year-old sheikh whose Qur'an readings have made him the hero of an enraptured public. As many as 50 000 crowd the mosque - second largest after that in Mecca - and the space in front of it to hear a man one listener called the most beautiful voice in Morocco. "I live on the other side of town," said one woman: "But I come here to Hassan II Mosque to listen to Sheikh Kazebri. When he recites from the Qur'an, the word of God reaches most deeply inside me. "Many are in tears when they hear him because there is so much emotion in his voice." Sheikh Omar Kazebri, educated in Saudi Arabia, says he would like to succeed in reconciling respect for religion with modern life, and wishes religious fanatics would find their way to becoming more moderate.
