Profile on Harun Yahya:

"A leading Muslim intellectual from Turkey, Harun Yahya is the author of many books concerning the world of Islam such as the relationship of science and Islam, interfaith dialogue, and the importance of unity among believers of all faiths. Harun Yahya enjoys a wide readership from all nations, languages and religions, and many of his books have been translated into more than 40 languages. His works have also been received with interest by Western scientific circles, and some of his scientific texts have been reviewed in various scientific journals as the most important expositions of Islamic creationism. These journals include The New Scientist, Science, NCSE (National Center for Science Education) Reports, and The Cladistics."

Profile on Tariq Ramadan

Islamist royalty. Terrorist sympathizer. Anti-Semite. Double-talker. These are just a few of the accusations made against Tariq Ramadan, the 42-year-old Swiss-born philosopher and activist who is one of the best-known figures in European Islam. He's a public intellectual with a popular following, and his articles and lecture tapes sell briskly in Europe's impoverished immigrant neighbourhoods. He's become a touchstone for controversy, which erupted most recently in July, when the State Department revoked his visa without comment just before he was to begin a prestigious teaching position at Notre Dame.

There's a reason Ramadan gets treated like a radical: He is one.

"I am a symbol of what's coming, a new generation of Muslim leaders - men and women - able to speak English as you are speaking English and French as they do in France. They are European, they are American, and they are going to speak for themselves."

Mr and Mrs Faisel Essof have kindly submitted a manuscript to CCN that they prepared as a guide aimed at women who will be performing their Faraz Salaah with Jammat in the Haram. Based on their personal experiences from 2000, this document came about, according to Faisel, after observing that many of the ladies appeared to be having difficulties with performing their Salaah with Jamaah in the Haram because under normal circumstances they perform their Salaah at home on their own which is different from performing it in Jamaah. He also added that "...women never perform the Janaaza Salaah and for those who have been to Haj will tell you that almost after every Faraz Salaah there is a Janaaza Salaah. When all things are taken into account this is a logistical accomplishment of considerable proportions on the part of the Saudis. A remarkable feat by any standard and stretch of the imagination. Millions of people from hundreds of different countries and cultures speaking hundreds of different languages all converging at one place at the same time – and every year at that. It makes the organising of the Olympics pale into insignificance – and look at the fuss made of this only-once-in-every-four-years event!

One is reminded of the story of how the Saudi Government once decided to call in experts from the West to develop an efficient model for managing the operations during this period. After months of experimenting with "what if" scenarios and computer generated simulations the best solution that they could come up with was to have two Hajjs a year!

On arrival your passport gets taken from you and that is the last you will see of it until it is time to return home. But there was little cause for panic because just as quickly as it disappears from sight so does it miraculously re-appear when it is finally time to leave for home. Landing in Medina one can't help but feel an immediate sense of the history of the place and at the same time be humbled by its sanctity. You are greeted here by an air of calmness and tranquillity that is unmatched by any other city in the world. The breathtaking view from the hotel room balcony sends a dizzy rush of blood to the head and it becomes hard to contain either the emotion or the feelings of trepidation and anticipation of the days to follow. In fact no amount of pre-reading, pre-planning or fore-warning can completely prepare you for this truly unique experience.....

Handy Hajj Hints No. 2: Muzdalifah is the desert location approximately midway between Mina and Arafat. The pilgrim spends the night of the 10th of Zul Hijjah here. It can get pretty cold here this time of the year so take your sleeping bags along.

To all those embarking on this great journey the team at CCN wishes you *Hajj Mabroor*, and may Allah (SWT) grant you the *Hidaayat* and the strength to fulfil all your obligations, *inshaAllah*.

Kuraby Madressah Update

The Maddressah Committee has appointed **Imaam Ahmed Abu Gazaleh** as principal of the Maddressah. Placements are available for children who would like to attend Maddressah in 2005. Subjects taught at the Maddressah include Qur'aan Recitation & Memorisation, Fiqh (Islamic Teachings), Islamic History, Tahdhib (Morals & Ethics), and Practicals including Prayer & Supplication (Du'aa). Maddressah times are Mon to Thur 4.15pm to 6.15pm.

There are some vacancies for the 2005 Maddressah Teacher Training Program. This program is in its third year and has produced 25 Graduates thus far. It is conducted especially for ladies who intend teaching in Maddressahs. The classes run on Saturday mornings from 8.30am to 1.30pm. The subjects taught are Quraan, Tajweed; History; Fiqh (Islamic Teachings); Methodology and Psychology; and Tahdhib (Morals & Ethics). This program will commence at the end of January 2005 and continues till the end the year. The cost for attending the program is \$400.00 for the year.

Also, there are vacancies for teachers for the new term.
