AIF'S ROBUST RESPONSE IN SOMALIA... MAKING A WHOLESOME DIFFERNCE!

In what has been labelled the worst drought in 60 years, the recent drought in the Horn of Africa has led to the emergence of a tragic humanitarian situation. The lack of rain in the region, 80 percent less than in normal situations, has led to the failure of existing agriculture which has thus resulted in severe food and water shortages. The death of about 60 percent of the livestock, which represents the second source of livelihood for people in The Horn of Africa, has also exacerbated the problem. Increasing food prices have led to many farmers and herders not being able to purchase food for their sustenance. The only clouds that these people see are clouds of dust and the only storms that they experience are storms of sand. The failure of the international community in finding a long lasting solution to the political problems in Somalia has also exuberated an already desperate situation.

The Somalian Famine Crisis is a textbook example of a "complex emergency." There are many factors that influence the deliverance of aid by humanitarian organisations and the critical factor that stands out is the issue of security. Extra precaution and detailed planning has thus been carried out by The Al Imdaad Foundation in order to ensure that the safety of our staff and getting food into the right hands are our highest priorities. Having identified the most needy of recipients and ensuring the safety of our team, The Al Imdaad Foundation is now in a position to ensure that the aid that is given is the aid that is required and those that receive the aid are actually the ones that need it.

Due to the difficulty of the crisis not being centralised to one point, the Al Imdaad Foundation intends to respond to this disaster in the manner of a three pronged approach. Firstly, The Al Imdaad Foundation's Office in Jordan has been sponsored a Military Cargo Plane by the Jordanian Government at no cost. This plane will be stocked with all the necessary relief items required by those affected by the drought according to the report from the Al Imdaad Assessment Team that returned from the region at the end of July. A substantial amount will be transferred to our offices in Jordan to ensure that this plane is fully stocked with food and medical supplies amongst other things. This plane will be bound for Somalia, one of the worst hit regions.

The Al Imdaad Foundation will also respond to the high number of Internally Displaced Peoples (IDP's) and refugees on the Kenyan Border. The influx of people into these camps increases daily and The Al Imdaad Foundation will establish a presence in these camps in order to distribute much needed relief aid items.

Finally, The Al Imdaad team will also provide direct aid to starving Somalis at various refugee camps in Somalia. AIF teams are currently on the ground distributing desperately needed food aid and medical supplies. Distributions to thousands of IDP's have already been carried in the BUULO IDP REFUGEE CAMP, the ARIF IDP Camp, the WABER IDP Camp amongst other camps. The Al Imdaad Foundation also conducted primary health care clinics at certain camps. The Al Imdaad Foundation intends to be working in Somalia for a long time to come as a disaster of this magnitude cannot be resolved in a matter of a few days.

This multi-faceted approach will ensure that the aid will reach more people over a wider area rather than just a few within a concentrated area.
